Dear friends of good will,

The explosion of explicit antisemitism in parts of Australian society – on university campuses, in street protests, in mainstream and social media, and even among some claiming Christian belief – is shocking and deeply distressing. It speaks of the re-emergence of a latent distrust and culpable ignorance of the People of Jewish heritage, fuelled by deliberately fostered hatreds and loathing, and tied into dishonest agendas from extreme standpoints, both from the left and from the right.

None of the horror of what was perpetrated in Israel, nor any of the tragedy of what is unfolding in Gaza, justifies the perpetration of antisemitism in Australia. It does not teach our children of justice and mercy. It does not uphold and respect the dignity of people and peoples. It does not foster truth, which is necessary to set us free. The language of hatred and spite, of innuendo and slogan, is language emanating from a poisoned soul. It wounds and frightens; it belittles the lives of our neighbours.

The great Abrahamic religions believe in a God who is the Creator-Father of all human beings in His image and likeness. I also believe in his Divine Son, the man Jesus Christ, of Jewish heritage, who took upon himself this evil, so that we might be rid of it ourselves. Might we seek conversion of our souls and choose pathways where we learn to listen and speak with one another as sisters and brothers. It is the only way to achieve reconciliation and peace.

May the Creator of all humanity reign in our hearts.

SUNSMART

Australia has one of the highest rates of skin cancer in the world.

In Victoria, from September through to the end of April, average UV levels are 3 and above, which is when UV radiation can damage skin and eyes and lead to skin cancer. When the UV Index is 3 and above:

- 1. Slip on sun-protective clothing.
- Slop on SPF30+, broad-spectrum, water-resistant sunscreen; put it on 20 minutes before you go outdoors and every two hours afterwards.
- 3. **Slap** on a hat that protects your face, head, neck, and ears.
- 4. Seek shade.
- 5. **Slide** on some sunglasses make sure they meet Australian Standards.

Holy Child is a SunSmart School, and we enforce **NO HAT NO PLAY**.

Children must wear the school hat during the break times at school.

Children playing outside the school grounds, before and after school, are not supervised until 8.30am before school and up to 3.40pm after school. Many children are going to the Jack Culpin Car Park\Reserve and Gibbs Reserve, before and after school, to wait for their parents' drop-off and pick-up. We are not able to supervise your children in these areas.

Please ensure that your children are collected from the School Grounds in Area 1. If your child is not collected by 3.40pm they are to be collected from the Reception Foyer.

FOOD AND DRINK

During warmer weather, DRINK MORE WATER

As the weather warms up it is important that our children drink regularly.

Children will need a clearly named and refillable drink bottle.

Please do not send food that needs re-heating.

Due to health and safety, we are unable to heat children's food at school.

During cooler weather

As the weather cools, ensure children are appropriately dressed for cold rainy days and if they are wearing a beanie or gloves that they are navy blue or black.

Beanies are available for purchase at the school.

Recurring Bookings

Rocketeers Late Booking Fee

Late booking fee applies if a booking is made with less than 7 day's notice. Bookings made at least 7 days in advance of the session day are charged the early fee.

Sick child? No charge

No matter the cancellation rules, we operate a standing policy that there is no charge for a sick child. Simply let us know when cancelling a booking outside the cancellation window, provide a doctor's certificate and there will be no fee charged.

Child Care Subsidy* (CCS)

How can I help my child with narration skills?

Having good narration skills is an important type of discourse that has clear ties to socialisation, classroom discourse, and early literacy' (Gillam, 2018).

Engaging in narration skills at home with your child will help move them towards grade-level listening and reading understanding as well as speaking and story-telling skills. Narrative skills help children when talking with peers, being able to engage in classroom discussions and in their early reading skills.

As parents, your role is important in helping develop your child's narration skills.

- 1. Begin reading a story with your child.
 - Ask questions about each page. Who is the story about? Where are they? What are they doing? How does the person feel?
 - Talk more about what is going on in the picture than the words on the page.
 - Once you've read the page and asked questions, have your child re-tell what's going on in the story.
 - Do this with each page of the story.
- After you've finished reading the story ask your child to re-tell the story to you while looking back at the pictures.
 - See if they can use the correct character, setting, action, and feelings of the characters.

Examples of how goals can be targeted during narration.

<u>Speech</u>- If your child has a speech sound error, use narration skills to practice that sound. If you're reading a book with your child, emphasise that speech sound. "The Lion is the king of the jungle", "Lions hunt for prey." Then, when your child is re-telling the story you can help them emphasise the speech sound they have in error.

<u>Vocabulary</u>- When working on narration skills while reading with your child, select 1-2 new words in the story and talk about what they mean. Once you are done with re-telling the story you can look up the words/pictures for more understanding.

There are many opportunities to work on narrative skills with your child! Even telling them your own personal stories is incredibly important.
