A Little History



Holy Child Primary School is the parish primary school of Dallas, which serves the suburbs of Coolaroo, Meadow Heights, Dallas, Upfield, Campbellfield, and parts of Broadmeadows.

The Josephite Sisters established Holy Child Primary School, Dallas, in 1965 (Parish Reg). The Josephite ethos of pastoral care and community involvement are the hallmark of the Holy Child community.

St. Mary MacKillop, in full, Saint Mary Helen MacKillop, also called Saint Mary of the Cross, (born 15 January 1842, Melbourne, Victoria, Australia - died 8 August 1909, North Sydney, New South Wales, Australia and canonized 17 October 2010. St Mary Mackillop's Feast Day is 8 August.

We are proud that Holy Child Primary was the first in Australia to start a children's Mary MacKillop group!

Deputy Principal Message

Mary MacKillop 1842 - 1909



Mary Mackillop worked for over 40 years helping the poor. She began an Order of teaching nuns and opened schools, refuges and orphanages across Australia. The Government at that time did not help people who were sick or poor, and without Mary's work many would have die.

Mary was born in Fitzroy, but her parents had come from Scotland. She was the eldest of eight children and the family was quite poor, but Mary had been well educated by her

father. Mary first started working as a governess, then as a teacher.

With the help of a good friend, Fr. Julian Tenison Woods, Mary began an Order of nuns, known as the Sisters of St. Joseph. The main aim of the nuns was to serve God by providing an education for poor children. Mary opened a school in an old stable in Penola in South Australia, because there was no money to build a proper school. Later Mary opened another school in Adelaide and with the help of the sisters who had joined her Order, soon opened many other schools in Australia and later in New Zealand.

In 1871, there was a clash between Mary and the Bishop of Adelaide, who wanted Mary and the sisters to make some changes. Mary was not prepared to compromise as the changes were likely to disadvantage the poorer children, so Mary was excommunicated, which means she was no longer allowed to receive the Eucharist. This broke Mary's heart, because she loved God so much and the Eucharist was very important to her. This lasted for 5 months, but finally the Bishop realised he had been wrong and lifted the excommunication just days before he died. Mary must have been so sad during those 5 months, but she was determined to stand up for the poor even if it meant suffering for her. She showed great courage throughout this ordeal.

Later Mary also set up a home for homeless and sick people, orphanages for boys and girls, and a home for single mothers and their babies. Despite being very ill in later life, Mary continued to work for God right up until her death in 1909. The move to have her declared a saint began in 1926 and continued for many years. Following the visit to Australia by Pope John Paul in 1995 she is now known as Saint Mary MacKillop.



Holy Child can change the world. Be an environmental champion.


Say 'NO' to plastic bags! Use a reusable shopping bag when you can. They are strong and easy to use! You can reuse them hundreds of times!

Australia has one of the highest rates of skin cancer in the world.

Parent Parking

- You should **not** be parking in the disabled parking bay nor should you be parking in front of the gate. The gate needs to be clear at all time for emergency access.

Orthographic Mapping & Sight Words

What?

Orthographic Mapping is how our brains learn to read and store written words. It is the connection between speech sounds and the letter/s that represent that sound, and their word meanings (Ehri, 2014). When we first learn to read, we begin to map sounds to letter/s and store this information in our brains. We use this mapping system to allow us read, spell, and understand words.

<u>Sight words</u> are words that are recognised and read immediately (Ehri, 2014). Because we recognise the word so quickly, it is almost as if we have read it by 'sight', but in actual fact, it is due to the strong connection we have made between the sounds, letters, and word meaning (Orthographic Mapping) as beginning readers that we can do so. Without prior mapping of the sounds to letter/s, words are not recognisable by 'sight'. As we become more efficient readers, the aim is that almost all words will be 'sight' words (Ehri, 2014)

So what?

Orthographic Mapping is important for learning to read (Ehri, 2014). Through practice and repeated exposure to what sounds map onto what letter/s, this connection is 'engraved' into our long-term memory, and we become more reliable and quicker at reading words without thinking too much. For example, beginner readers see the word 'sat' and may break it into its individual sounds 's-a-t' so they can read it. With more experience, the brain uses the repeated exposure to the sound-letter combinations and can retrieve and read words, like 'sat', and unlock its meaning instantaneously.

Now what?

The research shows that the best way to support Orthographic Mapping is through Systematic Synthetic Phonics (Ehri, 2020). This is because this approach explicitly teaches what sound/s map onto what letters/groups of letters. This explicit teaching means that the connection between sound/s and letter/s can be stored in the brain for rapid retrieval, leading to fluent, skilled reading. Some strategies that can be used in the home to support Orthographic Mapping include:

- Talking about sounds and what letters may represent them E.g., The 'a' sound is shown by this letter
- Bringing your child's awareness to written words and talking about the sounds that the letters make
- Encouraging your child to sound out unfamiliar words and push the sounds together to read the word.
